






In university classes (especially liberal art classes)

the class size may be limited to certain number of students, so getting into those classes is based on a lottery system. Registering the classes you want to take during


the preferences registration period is called Chūsen tōroku.


































[The First Year Confusion]
Many first year university students feel a strong sense of confusion and difficulty due to the various differences between high school and university.


For example, there is a phenomenon called "First Year Confusion", which is often seen among first year university students during the transition from high school to university







